Balancing Learning and Summer Fun!

Prioritize Your Studying Time


Once you have a class or two picked and your schedule of activities and assignments planned, now it's time to think how much of your day needs to be devoted to your school work.

Thinking of Taking A Course Or Two This Summer?

Taking courses through the summer is a great way to get ahead of the game and keep you in a strong academic stride. The overall question a lot of families and students have, is that is it even possible to complete classes in the summer time, before the traditional start of the school year? In fact, yes, indeed it is! There are a few key factors to being successful in taking classes over the summer.

First, ask yourself, Do I have enough time to fit a class into my schedule?

Classes that you would take during the summer are the same length and difficulty as classes that you would take during the traditional school year. A good recommendation would be that if you have decided to take courses during the summer, take 1 or 2 classes. So, think about it this way, in roughly two months you would be completing the equivalent of a full year course. You can lower the amount of work needed by looking into some half credit courses. These count toward graduation, you won't have to stress of completing two semesters and you will have your time during the summer to enjoy.

Second, consider this time to take some electives.

While not taking core classes, you can try out some electives that you normally wouldn't have thought about. Who knows, it may lead you to thinking about a career path that you may have never considered before. Again, don't overload your schedule, but maybe try two half credit electives in different fields of study and leave the core classes for the standard school year.

Last, look into print classes if available.

Our print courses are typically comprised of less assignments to submit for grading. They have the same amount of material as our online classes, but due to the way that they are graded, the number of graded assignments are less in number. This may be to your advantage because if you travel during the summer or go to summer camps or are just generally not around the house, you can take your materials with you anywhere you go.



End Of Year Tips From Keystone Teachers



Is your student finishing up their school year or looking at graduation in the very near future? Our Keystone teachers have some tips for our students as they near the end of their current set of courses!

- Do not wait until the last minute and do not just submit assignments to finish quickly.
 Submitting every assignment in a lesson just minutes apart from each other will most likely end up with the lowest grades.
- Take your time and ask questions!
- ◆ Students should double check that they have the **correct file uploaded when submitting assignments.** If an assignment needs to be reset,it will only delay grading.
- Be sure to have all three components of the discussion post submitted. (You can double check by keeping an eye on the gradebook).
- Finish strong. Don't rush through your work, don't submit incomplete work, and reach out for help before turning in.
- You can keep your math skills fresh by playing on Khan Academy (a free math resource).
 Find out what other subjects they have by visiting http://www.khanacademy.org/
- Careless errors can add up! Be sure to ask questions and schedule 1:1 meetings when needed.
- Leaving enough time between submitting the last assignment and the deadline for receiving a transcript. It takes about 2 weeks to receive an official transcript. You may email our Guidance Dept. for more information on this. They can be reached at Guidance@keystonehighschool.com
- If you feel like you are behind and won't finish on time, speak with our Student Success

Additionally, the GPA that will be used to apply to college will be based on all Keystone course grades earned in 9th-12th grade, so earning good grades for college applications begins as soon as possible.





Newer Computers and Keystone

Purchasing a new computer can be an exciting prospect, but you should be sure that the computer you settle on is compatible with Keystone! Thankfully, there are a wide variety of modern computers, operating systems, and browsers that can be used when taking Keystone courses.

Please see the helpful chart below for more specifics about which configurations are most compatible with this program:



NOTE: When using Windows, if you are using a 64-bit browser, you need to install 64-bit Java to match. If you're running a 32-bit browser, then you'll need to install 32-bit Java.

Please note that most of our online courses contain Flash, which is not supported in Apple's mobile operating system (iOS). This makes our courses incompatible with iPads (and iPhones).
